Hello Epiphany Friends,

Well, the flowers are blooming at church; no sidewalk petunias YET, but no potted ones yet either. Easter season is screaming by and Pentecost is coming fast it's May 19—and then Trinity Sunday is May 26, marking the beginning of Ordinary Time.

In an effort to lead to a Spirit filled Extraordinary time, the Worship Team has chosen to use a hymn called "Sing a New Church," or by its first line: "Summoned by the God Who Made Us." It is a familiar tune, but the words are new to us, written by a Benedictine Sister, Delores Dufner.



We will introduce it on Trinity Sunday and while we won't sing it EVERY week, we will share a line (in order) each week in This Week at Epiphany for us all to meditate on, reflect on, and/or use in our prayers. You will also be invited (if you choose) to write a brief reflection (100 words or less) which will be included in the next week's email and many of them will be collected for the Enlightener. EPIPHANY ENDORSES HIGHER MINIMUM WAGE, PAID FAMILY LEAVE CAMPAIGN & BALLOT MEASURE

As a Just Peace Church, Epiphany United Church of Christ's Council has voted to endorse the Missourians for Healthy Families & Fair Wages campaign. According to a <u>fact sheet</u> distributed by the <u>Missouri</u> **Budget Project:** "Missouri voters will soon have the chance to put in place a common sense set of



guardrails to ensure that workers can reach their full potential and build prosperity for their families and communities, as well as our state's economy. An initiative on the 2024 ballot would build quality jobs by providing a much-needed raise to Missouri workers and guaranteeing earned sick leave for workers."

For several months, some Epiphany members have been gathering signatures on petitions to put a higher minimum wage and paid family leave on a 2024 ballot. Myisha Johnson, our Metropolitan Congregations United (MCU) organizer came to collect signatures at our last concert and has given support to members who volunteer in the campaign.

The 2024 ballot measure has these components:

INCREASE MISSOURI'S MINIMUM WAGE TO \$15/HOUR

- Missouri's minimum wage would increase from \$12/hour in 2023 to \$13.75/hour in 2025 and \$15/hour in 2026, with annual cost of living increases in subsequent years.
- The increase would give a much-needed raise to over 562,000 Missouri workers, who would earn an extra \$1,083 annually - enabling them to further contribute to their local economies.

- Nearly 90 percent of these workers are adults over age 20 who work at least 20 hours a week.
- Nearly one in four Missouri kids live in households that would see an increased income, which has been proven to improve health and educational outcomes for children.

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ALLOW WORKERS TO EARN 5 TO 7 PAID SICK DAYS EACH YEAR

- Private sector, wage earning workers would earn one hour of sick time for every thirty hours worked.
- An estimated 938,000 Missouri workers do not currently have access to paid sick leave.
- The ballot measure's paid sick leave provisions would reach 728,000 Missouri private sector workers.

MISSOURI HOUSE PASSES RESOLUTION ENDING MAJORITY RULE IN MISSOURI CITIZEN INITIATIVES INCLUDING BALLOT CANDY DESIGNED TO TRICK VOTERS

Missouri voter protection advocates strongly condemned action by the Missouri House of Representatives today passing SJR74 - which would eliminate majority rule that has defined Missouri's citizen initiative process for more than a century. Lawmakers also added so-called "ballot candy" that would have no practical impact but is designed to trick Missouri voters and hide the measure's true impact.



Missouri Voter Protection Coalition, Missouri's

nonpartisan statewide coalition of voter protection advocates, including more than 70 organizational partners, along with its team at Jones Advocacy Group, has lead the legislative opposition to the more than two dozen measures introduced this year that would end majority rule and impede Missouri's long-standing citizen initiative process.

SJR 74, sponsored by Sen. Mary Elizabeth Coleman, who has her sights set on becoming Missouri's chief election official, would end majority rule through a confusing concurrent majority requirement, which would allow as few as 23 percent of of Missouri voters to override measures supported by a majority of Missourians.

The Missouri House added additional amendments including citizenship and foreign funding mandates that are already part of Missouri law, but designed to trick voters. Testimony from Missourians on this and similar measures has overwhelmingly opposed the legislature's efforts to end majority rule.

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Following a contentious debate, including forceful objections from Representatives Jamie Johnson, Ashley Aune, Deb Lavender, Joe Adams, Eric Woods, Peter Meredith, Kevin Windham, Barbara Phifer, David Tyson Smith, and Crystal Quade, the House passed the resolution by a vote of 102-49. The measure now goes back to the Senate, where a filibuster is expected to challenge the inclusion of the "ballot candy" provisions. If approved there, the proposed change would go to the ballot for approval by Missouri voters.

In response to today's action, Denise Lieberman, director and general counsel of the Missouri Voter Protection Coalition issued the following statement:

"Missouri Voter Protection Coalition is disappointed that the Missouri House passed SJR 74, which would end Missouri's more than century-long tradition of majority rule in the citizen initiative process. We are particularly appalled that House members chose to include needless ballot candy intended to confuse voters and hide the true impact of the measure, which is to end majority rule for voters in Missouri.

"To be clear, SJR 74 ends 'one-person, one-vote' in Missouri, allowing some votes to weigh more than others," Lieberman added. "The measure allows a small minority of Missourians to override the will of the majority. We are grateful to the many lawmakers who stood up for the will of the voters of Missouri, and disappointed that lawmakers refused to heed their call. We intend to keep up the pressure as the measure moves back to the Senate to protect the rights of all Missourians to make their voices heard at the ballot box."
